The Pilot's Oath

I do solemnly swear or affirm that I will exercise Federal Air Regulation 91.3

(Responsibility and authority of the Pilot in Command) on any flight that I undertake.

Further I swear or affirm that I will NEVER STOP LEARNING in regards to aviation safety.

Further I swear or affirm that I will become a subject matter expert on any aircraft that I fly and that I will exercise the privileges of my airmen's pilot certificate to insure that the outcome of any flight, maneuver or statement I make is never in doubt.

Further, I solemnly swear or affirm that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservations and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of exercising the privileges upon which I am about to receive as a United States of America certified licensed aviator.

Traditionally an oath (from Anglo-Saxon āð, also called plight) is either a statement of fact or a promise with wording relating to something considered sacred as a sign of verity. A common legal substitute for those who conscientiously object to making sacred oaths is to give an affirmation instead.

Affirmation, Affirmations or Affirm may refer to: Affirmation, a declaration that something is true. make a solemn statement or promise undertaking to do something or affirming that something is the case.
